MAYOR'S AWARDS FOR STUDENTS


Ilr Joy Allen, the Mayor of Bishop Auckland has visited King James I Academy to present three of its students with some very prestigious awards.

A group of 31 students in Years 7-12 have recently taken part in an exciting five day trip to *Ullswater Outward Bound Centre* in the Lake District.

This trip, which takes place every year in April, gives students the opportunity to take on a variety of outdoor challenges, which are all designed to build self-confidence, stamina and resilience. As this is the first time that many of the participants have stayed away from home, it is also en excellent opportunity to gain independence.

At the centre, students took part in team building activities to help them build mutual trust and to encourage them to work together throughout the trip in order to achieve the best outcome. They then took on the famous 'Jog and Dip' challenge, which involves a cross country run followed by an exhilarating jump into the freezing cold lake, an activity which certainly demands courage!

During the adventure, students also went Hill Walking and tried Gorge Walking and Cliff Diving. There was even an overnight camping expedition and, on the final evening, teams gathered around the camp fire for a fun quiz and the opportunity to share their favourite experiences from the trip overall.

his year has seen an exciting display of creativity and determination by the Dramatic Arts Department. Students have produced dynamic and electrifying performances and have achieved both academically and personally.

In the first Year 12 Improvisation
Performance, the intention was to have the audience decide and alter the narrative for the characters to perform. Control of what happens to the characters was completely in the hands of the audience. This was done via a dialogue within the performance, where the audience were given options to choose from, or use one of their own suggestions.

The cast prepared a montage of scenes with staging inspired by the work of the artist, Russ Mills. This collosseum-style layout provided atmosphere and context to the action.

The main intention for performance two was to educate the audience about how current social issues could escalate in the near future. The cast wanted the audience to think about their own lives and relate to issues such as power, secrets and social status. This was our chosen aim because it would encourage the audience members to realise negative aspects of their own lives and change them for the better.

The cast wanted to express a dystopian world to the audience to show what could happen in the future if society continues to act irresponsibly. Hierarchy was a recurring theme throughout the performance, due to the separation of factions and how society treats people. This was shown through communication between characters, as well as visually with the set. It was timeless but had futuristic elements, adding to the mystery.

The aim of the piece was that the audience would form their own private connections with the characters and subconsciously create their own ideals for the situation.

Year 13 Performing Arts students, Shelley Edwards, Beth Brown and Josie Potter experimented in deconstructing the theme and narrative of the musical *Ghost*. The

character of Molly was split into three roles and interpreted as the three female influences on Sam who has died; Mother, Wife and Sister. Songs were also re-worked to reveal dark undertones and themes of grief, loss and sorrow.

The performance was skillfully designed to give the audience a sense of the emotion rather than take them upon a chronological journey. The combination of acting and physical theatre allowed the cast to be creative in the interpretation, allowing dance to flow freely into creative body work, and the desired impact on the audience was one of thought and contemplation.

If the audience were already familiar with the musical, it may have contextualised some of the characters, however if they were new to the genre, it could be interpreted as a stand-alone piece with heartache, anguish and control at the centre of the performance. Year 12 Drama students Molly Brannan, Callum Jones, Faye Hindmarch and Emma Hardy, pictured above, explored and performed *The History Boys* by Alan Bennett. They performed a creative piece which fused naturalistic theatre with the abstract nature of theatre practitioner, Boal. They were also put under immense personal pressure to perform a 2-3 minute monologue, which they completed with great flair.

This year saw some outstanding Year 11 performances from an extremely talented year group. Students were particularly dedicated and showed a real passion on stage. They were diligent and sensitive in their performances of John Godber's *Shakers, Bouncers* and *Teechers,* and this year we experimented with an innovative text called *Blackout* by Davey Anderson.

Students showed real grit and put in a lot of extra-curricular rehearsal, which should lead to some very high grades in August.

They also heard about the risks associated with alcohol and drug use, and were able to experience the effects of alcohol in the 'Beer Goggles' demonstration. Wearing the special glasses, which simulate the effect of being under the influence, volunteers were asked to perform a set of simple challenges such as throwing a ball and walking in a straight line; as expected, participants did not perform well!

Following this, students considered whether it would be safe to get into a car with someone who had been

drinking or taking drugs, or indeed whether it would be safe to walk home alone in this vulnerable condition.

In a seminar on relationships, students debated what constitutes abuse and learned how to identify the signs of emotional and mental abuse. Through clips of relevant storylines in TV shows such as Hollyoaks, our speaker was able to initiate a debate on inappropriate levels of control and bullying in all kinds of relationships. Afterwards, students said that the session had made them think more about the relationships that surround them and feel more confident to seek help should they ever find themselves in a difficult position.

Our students now know how to avoid harm and feel empowered to take charge of their own safety.

skill is necessary for the workshops or the performance.



Euan Elliott won Best in Year for Year 13, and Alex Philpott swept the rest of the categories winning a Bronze certificate, Best in Year for Year 12, and Best in School

The £750,000 studio facilities at Teesside gave students the opportunity to experience film-making as a production team in an industry-style setting. Individuals took on a variety of roles in the studio, from Camera and Lighting Operators to Directors, Studio Managers and performers with outstanding results. Under the guidance of Mark Handscombe, Senior Lecturer at Teesside, students worked together to produce a performance video for 1 Bet You Look Good on the Dancefloor' by Arctic Monkeys.

With strict time restrictions to consider, the experience was the ultimate lesson in working as a production team as effective communication was essential in order to achieve the end result on time. The music video completed the production work for their BTEC course in Creative Media Production.

Year 12 student, Logan Ladd took on the role of Director in the studio. He said, "The Director's job is to take control and instruct the whole team so I was nervous at first, however I soon felt more confident and really enjoyed it. I now plan to study at Teesside University."

MOVIES, MAGAZINES & MEDIA CAMPAIGNS

t's been a busy term for Media students at both Level 2 and Level 3. Students have worked hard to create a variety of professional quality products for realistic client briefs; these are written by the tutor and designed to provide plenty of scope for creative freedom.

Students in Years 11 and 12 have created spreads for a youth lifestyle magazine and in the process, they have developed skills in journalism, photography and graphic design. Magazine topics show the diversity of our students' interests with final spreads including articles on movies, sport, cooking, music, fashion and biographical pieces. Some students have also been successful in writing news articles which have been published on our website and in the local press. Year 13 students also took delivery of their commercially-printed career magazine entitled 'Choices'.

Year 13s have also completed their film production unit with genres including psychological thriller and supernatural; and most recently, they have worked together on a cross-media campaign to raise the profile of our Sixth Form. This campaign involved the creation of a promotional video, which is now on our website and social media platforms, a Sixth Form magazine, and a student-led Sixth Form Instagram page @kj1life. Students have also created a bespoke Media Department page @kj1media to showcase student work, trips and events.

Geography field trip to

ALNWICK GARDENS AND CASTLE

Geography students take part in a variety of learning activities outside of the classroom as part of their studies. Regular field trips to investigate topics such as population, tourism, impact of adverse weather and flood defences help students to put their classroom learning into perspective.

Most recently, Sixth Formers visited Alnwick Gardens, Alnwick Castle and the town centre, to study tourism and compare the local shops and facilities with those at Bishop Auckland. This trip formed part of their coursework for a unit of study called 'Changing Places'.

Students visited the stunning landscaped gardens, which surround the castle and are a highly successful tourist attraction. They also marvelled at the enormous and beautifully crafted 'Treehouse Restaurant", pictured here, which is built from sustainably-sourced Canadian Cedar, Scandinavian Redwood and English and Scots Pine. The structure has rope bridges, walkways in the sky and one of the most unique restaurants to be found anywhere in the world with trees growing through the floor and handcrafted furniture.

Students also visited 'Kynren' to consider the impact, both negative and positive, that this attraction has had upon our local area since it opened in 2016. They looked at the positive impact upon employment



and local businesses and considered some of the negative aspects such as the implications for local residents in terms of parking difficulties.

Other popular field trips include visits to various towns and villages in the Lake District to study areas that have been severely affected by flooding in the past decade and look at the flood defences which have allowed them to recover and rebuild.

Well done to all of the local Primary schools that have taken part in our *Mini Enterprise Project* this year. The project, which began in October, was designed to introduce primary pupils to the exciting world of business and encourage entrepreneurial skills.

Teams from local schools, *Victoria Lane*, *Etherley Lane*, *St Helens*, *Timothy Hackworth* and *St Anne's* all successfully set up a mini enterprise to run in their school. Then on a number of visits to King James, the schools completed a variety of themed challenges in order to gain points.

First, they were set the challenging task of setting up a successful business with a £10.00 starting budget from King James. They then needed to create a range of suitable products to sell both in and around their school. Ideas included seasonal best sellers such as bookmarks, Mother's Day flowers, cakes, Christmas decorations and Valentine's Day love notes.

Following the final challenge, Victoria Lane Primary's 'VLA Biz Kids' claimed the Enterprise Champions title. The school prepared a detailed business plan and designed an engaging logo, as well as making an amazing £415 for their school! Pupils are going to use the money to buy new books and floor cushions for their library. What's more, they intend to keep trading and already have ideas for Father's Day and selling ice creams.

e organise an exciting and extensive Primary Outreach programme to engage pupils in our local primary schools. Challenges give youngsters the opportunity to experience secondary-style learning and facilities.

The theme for this arts-based challenge ties in with The Big Draw event. Students will attend an introduction to the event where they will learn new creative skills and techniques. Children will return to school with the tools they need to work on their creative outcomes, then attend a final event which will involve students exhibiting their work and taking part in a large-scale collaborative piece of art work.



HISTORY: THROUGH THE AGES

This challenge will be in partnership with The Heritage Action Zone and the festivals they have organised to celebrate various aspects of Bishop Auckland through the ages. The project will focus on local history; students will research a particular aspect, such as school life during WWII. The final event will involve all schools working together to share everything they have learned in a final celebration.

LITERACY: KJ BOOK AWARDS

Students will each receive a book to read and will compete in a series of tasks back at school in preparation for the final challenge day. This will involve lots of activities and competitions such as quizzes, acting out scenes and a spelling tournament focused around the five books that childern have read. Schools will be provided with two copies of each book to keep and use in a book swap with other schools.

Hosting the annual festival of **PRIMARY SHAKESPEARE**



ast term, King James hosted the annual two-day Primary Shakespeare Festival as part of the Royal Shakespeare Company's Associate Schools Project.

Each year a cluster of primary schools from the local area come together at King James to perform one of Shakespeare's famous plays. This year's play was one of the greatest romantic tragedies of all time, Romeo and Juliet.

Over two days in our Main Hall, eleven schools, including King James, performed a given scene from the tragic tale for an appreciative audience of parents, members of the Royal Shakespeare Company and a representative from the Theatre Royale in Newcastle.

The show also introduced parents to the 'Shakespeare Ambassadors' from several schools; these are children who have

expressed a passion for Shakespeare and his work and put themselves forward to represent their schools in Shakespearerelated activities such as this annual festival. They also work hard to promote learning about Shakespeare within their

Georgia White, a member of the RSC who works closely with the Shakespeare Ambassadors, said, "All youngsters will study a Shakespeare text at school at some point, so it is important that they are fully engaged and able to access his work in an enjoyable way. Students realise that they can relate to the characters and themes of Shakespeare's work and this gives them a much greater understanding."

STEM: BALLOON CAR CHALLENGE



ENTERPRISE: KING JAMES BUSINESS MAGNATES

This challenge gives students the opportunity to develop their own business idea. It begins with students forming a company that costs no more than £10 to start up. They will then develop a business plan and launch their company. After six weeks trading in their own school, students will return to King James to submit their final profit figures, pay back their original investment and find out who has made the most profit!

SPORT: THE DAILY MILE

At the launch event at King James, students from a number of primary schools will participate in The Daily Mile challenge and complete their first timed mile. The scheme gets children out of the classroom for 15 minutes each day to run or jog, at their own pace, with their classmates. This will make them fitter, healthier and more able to concentrate in lessons. Pupils will then return to their own school and complete daily mile challenges before returning to King James for the final challenge day.

Fiona Clayton, the Programme Developer for the Associate Schools Project, attended on behalf of the RSC. She said, "We have learned a lot from working with schools and developed new ways to bring Shakespeare to life for the next generation. The project helps children get more involved with the RSC, especially those who may want to pursue a career in acting or backstage work, as each year we invite selected students to work with us in Stratford-upon-Avon. This helps with youth talent development."

The project has had fantastic feedback from both children and parents. Not only does it show young people that Shakespeare is worthy of their appreciation, but it also brings his work to the community.



Twelve students have been selected for the trip based on their exceptional achievement, behaviour, positive attitude to learning and the large number of achievement points they have earned in lessons. Prior to the trip, students will divide into four teams, each led by a member of staff, and teams will compete against each other to complete a series of challenges in the beautiful Spanish cities of Madrid and Barcelona. Although the group will travel to Spain together, once in the city the race will be on to solve a series of cryptic clues, which will be provided by Mr Grieveson. Teams will gather photo evidence to prove they have solved the clue! The group will spend three days in Madrid and a further three days in Barcelona, with plenty of opportunities for experiencing Spanish cuisine and culture built into the itinerary.

This is an exciting opportunity; the trip is designed to develop leadership skills and offers a way for us to reward those students who give 100% to their studies on a daily basis. Participants will also get to lead their own team of students in an exciting 'Challenge Durham' experience, which will take place in the next academic year.

MALTA & GOZO

n September, Year 12 Media students will travel to Malta for a week of culture, sightseeing and documentary film making.

Students will visit some of the most historic sites on the island including the *Grand Harbour* in Valetta and Mdina, the Silent City, alongside tourist attractions such as *Popeye Village*, the film set used in the 1981 movie starring Robin Williams. The itinerary also includes a variety of excursions and activities including a Blue Lagoon Island Tour to Comino, a Segway tour on the nearby island of Gozo and a trip to Malta Zoo, alongside visits to some of the many museums and churches on the island. Throughout the trip, students will write scripts and gather film footage, which will be edited into a travel documentary about the island on their return to King James. This moving image project forms part of their coursework for their Level 3 BTEC in Creative Media Production.

AMSTERDAM

msterdam has so much to offer in terms of culture and opportunities for learning. There are two trips to look forward to in the next academic year.

In October, Sixth Form students will have the opportunity to visit Amsterdam for a cultural experience involving a range of sightseeing and learning activities. Walking tours around the city will allow students to take in the elaborate architecture, and the itinerary will include a visit to the *Museum District*, the *Jewish Quarter* and a visit to the *Anne Frank Museum*. Students will learn about Amsterdam during the Nazi occupation and visit the *Auschwitz Monument*.

In May 2020, a group of 40 students in Years 7 and 8, accompanied by staff in our PE Department, will travel to Amsterdam for a football-themed experience. During the six-day trip, students will be coached by *Ajax Academy* staff and play friendly matches with some of the local youth teams; this really is a football fan's dream. There will also be plenty of time to experience Dutch culture and for city sightseeing.

At the end of each academic year we organise an Activity Day to reward our students for their hard work and



ormer King James student, Prof. Philip Hodgson, currently leads the School of Law, Criminology and Social Sciences at the University of Derby. Here he explains his progression from student to Professor.

"I lived in Watling Road, Bishop Auckland and attended King James between 1976 and 1983. On completing my A'Levels I went to Newcastle Polytechnic to take a Business Studies course but in my second year I was offered a job as a police officer with the City of London Police, and rather than complete my studies decided to take the job. Unfortunately, due to health issues I left the Police five years later but decided to go back to University. I enjoyed working with offenders so thought I would train to be a probation officer and at the end of my degree course (during which I spent a semester in Florida), I was offered funding to study at the University of Cambridge and read for a MPhil in Criminology."

"Throughout my studies I worked in probation hostels and childrens' remand homes so as well as academic experience I was also gaining practical experience, which allowed me to relate theory to practice and get the most from both my studies and work. On completing my MPhil, I was lucky enough to get a fully funded PhD studentship and when I finally finished my studies I then got a job as a Researcher with NACRO, where I worked on a number of projects looking at drugs, young people and crime."

"After four years with NACRO I went to work as the Strategic Crime Lead for Nottingham Crime and Drugs Partnership. This was an exciting and challenging role, not least because Nottingham had a huge crime and drugs problem. We were however very successful and made massive reductions in both crime and drug use. I was also lucky enough to get funding from my employer to undertake a MBA. During this time I also began to do guest slots at Nottingham Trent University as a Lecturer and in 2006 decided to apply to NTU for a full time position. I spent six years there before moving to the University of Derby where I am now Head of School for Law and Social Sciences and also Assistant Dean of the Centre of Policing Excellence."

"In December 2018, I was conferred as a Professor of Criminology; it really is a fantastic job and I am privileged to lead an amazing team of around 60 academics. My advice is to always strive to better yourself and you will achieve your goals."


