Working to create an easy

ransition

▲ t King James, we recognise the importance of beginning the Atransition from primary to secondary school early. We want our new starters to look forward to joining our school and to feel confident, so our programme begins with pre-school.

The transition process starts for us with the extensive Outreach Programme we offer to our local primary schools. Pupils from Years 1-5 are invited to attend King James to take part in Art, Music and Drama projects, all of which are designed to introduce young children to secondary school life and allay any fears from an early age. Children from Acklet Close Nursery also joined us in our Art Department to work on a creative mosaic project to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles.

In our annual Year 5 Curriculum Week 2023, pictured below, pupils from 14 local primary schools enjoyed a host of educational activities in all subjects from Maths, English, Science and History, to Languages, Geography, Food, Sport, Art, Drama, ICT and Music. These students are then invited to attend our vibrant annual Year 6 Open Event, which takes place on September 27th this year. This is an excellent opportunity for families to join us in school to meet our staff and students and enjoy an evening of guided tours and subject-themed activities to help parents and guardians choose the best secondary school for their child.

For those students who are enrolled to start King James in September, the programme is extensive. It includes a number of welcome events where children and their parents can meet our Academy Leadership Team and Year 7 Form Tutors, and Year 6 Induction Days, which take place in school in July; these give pupils the chance to take part in timetabled lessons and join King James students for break and lunch in our Dining Hall. Finally, our hugely popular Summer School, detailed right, is designed to build confidence and independence, and to forge firm friendships.

ach year, our Transition Summer School gives Year 6 students who are entering King James in September, the opportunity to make new friends and build independence well ahead of the new academic year.

It's important to us that our new Year 7 students feel confident in their surroundings from day one and that they are excited to attend their lessons. All students meet their Tutor at our Year 6 welcome meeting in May, and then again in July when they attend Year 6 Curriculum Week. Here, students take part in guided tours of King James to ensure that they are familiar with all of our buildings, and they also enjoy a range of lessons in school so they know what to expect when September comes. By joining our existing students for break and lunch, they become comfortable with our mealtime system too. From experience, we know that all of these things make a huge difference to our new starters.

Our Summer School, which takes place during the first week of the holidays, is designed to

allow students to discover their potential, and develop resilience through team games and outdoor activities. This year, new starters spent two days in school taking part in activities including sport, cooking, drama, art, maths and even basic first aid, before attending Weardale Adventure Centre over a three day period where they enjoyed a range of outdoor activities from canoeing and high ropes to archery and rock climbing.

Although the vast majority of students had never tried any of these before, they faced the challenges with great enthusiasm and strength of character. Many expressed a sense of personal pride and achievement in completing the tasks set for them, and returned home with greater confidence and many new friends.

C tudents at King James are celebrating another fantastic set of exam results across all academic and vocational qualifications with many pupils achieving the highest grades.

Following excellent GCSE results, many of our students have now joined our Sixth Form to continue their studies at a higher level. We have also welcomed a number of external candidates from other secondary schools and look forward to helping them all achieve their goals for the future over the next two years.

Sixth Formers celebrated outstanding results in a wide range of both academic and vocational subjects, and 100% of those who applied, achieved a place to study at their first choice of University. Students are now beginning a wide variety of degree courses, or undertaking a range of higher college courses and industry apprenticeships. Results were positive in all academic subjects, but outcomes were particularly strong in Maths, Psychology and History. In creative and vocational courses, results were equally impressive, with all students in Media Studies achieving the highest grade possible and all but one achieving the highest grade in Business. Results in Art also continued the tradition of excellent results in the subject.

Notable achievers include Hannah Stewart, who is soon to begin a Degree in Archaeology and Anthrapology at University of Oxford thanks to outstanding grades in A' Level History, Sociology and English. Following top grades in Maths, Chemistry and Biology, Zoe Munro will be studying Medicine at York, and Chloe Wymer, who achieved a Triple Distinction* in Sport now has the choice of studying a Degree programme at Durham University or following an apprenticeship programme with GSK. Luke Emmott celebrated a grade A in Criminology and Distinction* grades in both Healthy & Social Care and Psychology, and Nicholas Hope will soon begin his Degree in Music at Newcastle. Year 7s perform Twelfth Night

s part of the Royal Shakespeare Company's Associate Schools Program, that is run across Durham and Tyne and Wear, Year 7 students have recently taken part in a contemporary performance of Twelfth Night.

Participants were able to enjoy the full process from auditioning for roles and taking part in rehearsals, to helping with costume, music and lighting decisions. The play was performed alongside 11 other schools from the area as part of a regional playmaking festival that aims to bring Shakespeare to life and encourage young people to have the confidence to read, understand and perform his plays. This years festival also coincided with the 400-year anniversary of Shakespeare's first folio being published.

All of the students involved were fantastic, overcoming their nerves and performing brilliantly in front of an audience of 200 people.

Developing industry skills in

Creative Media Production

The Media industry in the UK is booming and there are hundreds of career opportunities for talented creatives. Our media courses are designed to build specialist knowledge and a wide range of practical skills, and the department boasts 100% pass rate at both Level 2 and 3.



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In Media, students get a broad overview of the media industry, whilst giving them the opportunity to build a range of specialist skills including script writing, film making, editing, photography, graphic design and journalism.

Year 10 students are currently investigating the techniques used by media producers to engage their audience, and are analysing a variety of products from computer games and social media platforms, to films, TV shows and magazines. As part of this, they are able to debate the differences between modern products and those from past decades.

In Year 11, students are developing practical skills in photography and photo manipulation, page layout, journalism and the use of specialist Adobe creative software as they prepare to design a magazine for their exam component.

Year 13s produced fictional films and documentary programmes in their first year, including Ava Moffatt's investigative piece on the changing attitudes towards the LGBTQ+ community featuring interviews with TV celebrity, Scarlett Moffatt and local drag queen, Tess (pictured left). They are now working on a lifestyle magazine, with each student responsible for a double page spread on a topic of their choice.

Year 12s are beginning their learning journey by studying pre-production planning, looking at everything from market research, budgeting and risk assessments, to sourcing equipment, costume and props.





Art & Photography

ur Art & Photography Department offers students a host of opportunities to develop their creativity and to build technical skills.

Last term, Key Stage 3 students took part in an Alice in Wonderland themed competition with the best entries put on public display at the No42 Gallery in Bishop Auckland Market Place. Students in all year groups enjoyed the many opportunities offered by our working partnership with The Auckland Project, visiting the Mining Gallery to take part in creative workshops in mixed media, and to Auckland Castle where they enjoyed lessons in glass painting.

Year 10 GCSE Photography students completed a walking tour of Newcastle city centre to photograph the diverse architecture and bridges; this trip also included a visit to St James Park. In a previous session, the group also photographed graffiti art in Bishop Auckland.

As part of our Outreach Programme, the department worked with youngsters from Acklett Close Nursery on a creative project to celebrate the coronation of King Charles, where children worked together to create a mosaic of the royal crown. A number of creative workshops also took place in school with Year 4 pupils from local primary schools.

In Sixth Form, A' Level Art students were visited by a number of professional artists who shared their portfolio and discussed the techniques they use to achieve their personal style; they also talked about their career path into the industry. One of the visiting speakers was graffiti artist and graphic designer,

Graham Cleland, who fascinated students with his impressive portfolio.





Photography & Media in Barcelona

his month, students from our Photography and Media Studies departments have visited the beautiful city of Barcelona to gather creative materials for their coursework portfolio.

Students in Years 12 and 13 spent five days exploring the city's architecture, art, culture and cuisine, with sightseeing opportunities including a visit to Gaudi's gothic Sagrada Familia Cathedral, the Boqueria Food Market and the Arc de Triomf. Media students gathered photographs and information for a lifestlyle magazine, which they are currently producing in school, and photography students focused on architecture and local culture in their photography work.

Both departments offer the opportunity for students to take part in an international trip in September, with previous destinations including Malta, Madrid and Venice.





Learning at the Yorkshire Show

Year 10 students in our Food & Nutrition Department have enjoyed a full-day educational visit to *The Great Yorkshire Show* in Harrogate. The focus of the trip was food provenance and sustainability.

The Great Yorkshire Show is the UKs biggest celebration of food and farming; it therefore provides the perfect opportunity for students to learn about the origins of food, such as where it has been grown and raised, and also how it is distributed and marketed. Visitors to the show can also enjoy sampling some of the very best British produce, from cheeses, jams and chutneys to artisan breads, pies and cakes.

In the Food Hall, students were able to speak to British farmers about the challenges they face as food providers, and also professional cheesemakers who were more than happy to discuss the cheesemaking process and provide samples. They also watched demonstrations by professional chefs who showed them how game can be incorporated into delicious dishes; students also considered why this ingredient is now rarely used in domestic environments. In the livestock section, students looked at the different breeds of cattle, sheep and pigs. They spoke to exhibitors to find out which breeds produce the best meat and dairy, and where the different cuts of meat come from on the animals; they also learned how animals are reared ready for the food chain. Overall, the trip was an enlightening experience for students who reported a much greater appreciation of food as a result.

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Cooking & Languages at Gusto fingo!

Our weekly after school club, *Gusto Lingo*, allows students to build skills in international cooking and learn a language at the same time!

Participants get hands-on in the kitchen and learn how to prepare a range of traditional Spanish and French dishes such as Paella, Crepes, Croque Monsieur and Ratatouille, using specially designed recipe cards which are written in the relevant language. They also speak in the language throughout each cooking session and learn about the culture of the country to provide an all-round learning experience.

Visit from BBC Masterchef

ast term, Year 10 Food & Nutrition students were treated to a special visit from former *MasterChef* contestant, now successful private chef, Mike Bartley.



Mike, who is originally from Bishop Auckland, was a contestant on the 17th Series of MasterChef, which aired in 2021. He now operates as a private chef, running *Djam Kitchen*, which offers fine dining catering expereinces in people's homes, thus far catering for parties of 4 - 150 people!

Chef Bartley worked with Year 10 students in three sessions, demonstrating dishes including steak and peppercorn sauce, BBQ Korean chicken and pork gyozas. He also answered questions about his passion for cooking, his time on Masterchef, the launch of Djam Kitchen, and one of his favourite pastimes, which is foraging for ingredients in the wild such as wild garlic and sea buckthorn. Mike uses wild garlic in his own recipes, including his cheese and wild garlic scones and wild garlic taglietelle with wild garlic pesto; and he uses the berries of the coastal plant to make a sea buckthorn curd tart.



Years 9s achieve the prestigious

Duke of Edinburgh Awards

ast term, 30 of our Year 9 students achieved the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award by logging hours volunteering, doing physical activities, developing a new skill and completing a two day expedition.

The Duke of Edinburgh Awards programme was launched as a pilot scheme in 1956 by HRH Prince Philip as a way for young people to explore new interests, acquire self-confidence and gain a sense of purpose that would support them into their future. Following the sad loss of Prince Philip in 2021, the Dukedom of Edinburgh was conferred upon Prince Edward who, as the new Duke, also took on the patronage held by his father.

To achieve the Bronze Award, participants had to complete a minimum of three months of work for the volunteering, physical and new skill elements, followed by a two day expedition, which involved an orienteering challenge with overnight camping. In preparation for this, students took part in an 8.5 mile practice walk and an intensive session to learn emergency first aid, which included CPR, pictured right. Students completed a wide variety of volunteering projects, including gardening and painting in our on-site Forest School and sensory gardens. They also worked hard on school site maintenance, litter picking, and a range of animal and bird conservation projects. Some students incorporated their existing passion for football and reading by volunteering to help younger students as sports coaches and reading support mentors in our library, and there were a number of fundraising activities organised to benefit local charities.

For the physical element, some students opted to further develop an existing hobby, with hours logged taking part in football, martial arts, team sports, swimming and boxing, whilst others decided to try out a brand new physical activity including ice





skating and gym fitness. New skills included learning to cook, horticulture and garden construction projects, independently learning to speak Spanish and German with *Duo Lingo*, developing skills in creative arts, crafts and pottery, playing guitar and working on an allotment.

The DofE Awards programme has proved to be extremely popular, so this academic year, we will not only be offering the opportunity to a second group of Year 9 students, but we will also be working towards offering the Silver Award. This will give existing Bronze Award holders the chance to progress

even further and gain an even more prestigious award.

Carnegie Book Club

As part of our Carnegie Book Club, students in Years 7-9 take part in a host of organised activities and special events in the library.

Students get involved in the The Yoto Carnegies, which are the UK's longest running book awards, recognising outstanding reading experiences created through writing and illustration in books for young people. As part of this, students in the shadowing group took part in eight livestreamed events with authors who were all shortlisted for the Carnegie Medal.

Students heard the authors discuss their books, writing techniques and inspirations, and they also had the chance to ask questions. Authors also set challenges for students including writing stories in a similar style to theirs and researching some of the topics covered in their novels. Authors included Ruta Sepetys, Patrice Lawrence and last year's winner Katya Balen.



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ur library is not just a place for reading; it's also a hub for learning and socialising, with themed activities taking place throughout the year, both during and at the end of the school day.

Each year, World Book Day is a celebrated feature of our Library calendar. All students in Years 7-9 receive a free book from our Librarian and spend the day focusing on reading activities in all lessons. Students choose from a selection of books with genres from fantasy and drama to comedy. This promotes reading by making sure every young person can access a book regardless of their family circumstances or income. Pictured here with their books are Luca, Emma and Lennon.

All students in Key Stage 3 enjoy a timetabled lesson dedicated to reading. This encourages a love of reading for pleasure, whilst naturally building their

vocabulary and literacy skills in punctuation and grammar, all of which leads to greater achievement in English. We have appointed five Pupil Librarians who have been trained in using computer software to catalogue, index and classify stock, alongside customer services and how to plan a host of special events throughout the year to appeal to readers in all year groups.

Working in partnership with the

Auckland Project

arlier in the year, we established a working partnership with The ⁷ew Auckland Project, which gives us access to many of the venues, attractions and parkland the project offers, and an opportunity to deliver exciting learning opportunities outside of the classroom.

To launch the partnership, all Year 7 students attended a full-day, carousel-style visit where they were able to tour a number of the attractions including The Mining Gallery, Spanish Gallery, Auckland Castle and No 42 Gallery. Those with a head for heights also had access to Auckland Tower and a birds eye view across the Market Place and town centre.

The Art and Photography Department has made excellent use of the partnership; Year 8 students visited the Mining Gallery to take part in creative workshops in mixed media, and to Auckland Castle where they enjoyed lessons in glass painting. Year 9s took part in an art workshop at the Spanish Gallery with work inspired by the stunning Salvador Dali exhibition which attracted thousands of visitors to the town.

Year 11 Photography students took some outstanding photographs for their coursework, with a focus on the dramatic architectural angles of Auckland Tower; and they also gathered some amazing aerial shots from the top. Key Stage 3 students also took part in an Alice in Wonderland themed competition with the best entries put on public display at the No42 Gallery in the Market Place.

The former Champagne Bar in the Market Place has been repurposed and renamed Mrs M's Cafe, and our teachers can now book the space for an afternoon to inspire learners by delivering a lesson in a completely new environment. Our Academy Librarian delivered three special sessions to 50 students in Key Stage 3, all of whom had been chosen by their reading teachers to receive a reward for

hard work and progress.

At each session, students read from the book, The Light in Everything by Katya Balen. This fantastic story, which is set on the coast, is about blended families and a timid young boy who uses the Japanese art of origami to cope with his anxiety. In the sessions, students wrote poetry about the sea on origami paper, and then tried origami for themselves by folding their poem into a flower design.

Students in our Modern Foreign Languages Department enjoyed a tour of the Spanish Art Gallery followed by a meal at El Castillo tapas restaurant. This gave them the opportunity to learn about Spanish history through art, and absorb a little Spanish culture on our doorstop whilst practising their Spanish speaking skills.

Our Sixth Form students have also gained valuable work experience thanks to the partnership. Hannah Stewart explored her passion for art and history by working in The Spanish Gallery as a Visitor Guide, and Year 12 student, Kiera Watson also worked as a guide inside Auckland Castle, greeting tourists and answering 👞 📊

Where some secure apprenticeships in the field, others progress on to degree courses at University to study fitness, nutrition or physiotherapy.

International sport in Amsterdam

ast term, with international trips fully back on the agenda following the pandemic, our PE Department was able to reinstate its annual football-themed experience to Amsterdam.

A total of 45 students in Years 8 and 9 enjoyed three action-packed days in Amsterdam with football training sessions at the state-of-theart KNVB National Campus and friendly fixtures with local teams. Raising awareness of Online safety

n a world full of technology, online safety is more important than ever. We want to ensure our young people and their families are aware of the dangers and know how to protect themselves.

Students in all year groups learn about online safety as part of the core curriculum in Computer Science & IT, and the department also shares the most up-to-date information with parents and carers via direct messaging, our Academy website and social media.

All students at King James are issued with a personal Chromebook when they enter Year 7; they use these instead of desktop computers in the majority of lessons throughout their time with



us. Not only does this mean that every student has full access to technology at school and at home to help with their learning, but Chromebooks also offer excellent protection as any potentially harmful websites are blocked. Regular themed assemblies also ensure that students are kept up to date with topics such as fake news, catfishing, online grooming and cyberbullying.

Personal student (promebooks

Thanks to our successful Chromebook Scheme, all young people receive a personal laptop when they enter Year 7. This ensures that every student has access to technology both at school and at home as they progress through their school life.

We launched the Chromebook initiative six years ago; this means that students in every year group now have a laptop. We utilise the learning opportunities on offer in Google Classroom and Class Charts, alongside educational packages including MyMaths, Tassomai, Teaching Gadget, GCSE Pod and many more. There are a number of advantages for

students; not only do they build ICT skills quickly but they can also access learning resources with ease at home.



ach year, during the final week of term at King James, we host Activity Day, where Heads of Year organise a variety of fun activities for students in their year group.

Year 7s spent their day at Auckland Castle where form groups competed against each other in a range of challenges. They began with an introduction to the Deer Park followed by a some fun races and freeze frame games. Next, groups were given paper and tape and challenged to design and build a structurally strong castle, then after lunch, each form group created a timeline with their Tutor to reflect their Year 7 experiences at King James.

Learning outside of the classroom in

Geography

s part of their Geography lessons, students take part in a variety Cof practical field trips to study topics directly relating to their classroom learning. This boosts their understanding by giving real life context to their learning.

Last term, Year 11 students took part in two field trips with the first taking students to Seaham to study coastal vulnerability and change. There they collected data on how the size of stones changes dramatically from the base of the cliff to the waters edge. They worked in teams and placed a 'quadrat' every 3m on the beach, then from each quadrat they selected 10 stones at random and recorded the size; students found that as they got closer to the water, the stones got smaller.

Students also visited Tindale Retail Park and Bishop Auckland town centre to complete a land use survey and a pedestrian and traffic count. The purpose of the visit was to gather evidence to support a hypothesis, "Has the development at Tindale Retail Park caused Bishop Auckland town centre to decline?"

Year 8 students also enjoyed outdoor learning with land studies conducted at Auckland Park and also within our school site to assess how sustainable it is.

Studying mise-en-scene at Beamish Museum Vear 10 Media students recently visited *Beamish Museum* to study how sets, props, costume, hair and make-up are used to communicate a specific time period; in the media industry this

is called mise-en-scene.

Producers regularly use mise-en-scene techniques in film making, and Beamish offers an excellent opportunity to see how sets are created for period dramas. Popular tv productions such as Downton Abbey, Dark Angel and the many televised Catherine Cookson dramas have all used Beamish Museum as a film location in the past.

As students made their way around the various sections of the museum, they were able to fully appreciate the work that goes into ensuring that each external and internal 'set' provides an authentic representation of the era through appropriate architecture, landscaping, vehicles, furniture and small props. Museum staff also wear authentic costumes and sport appropriate hair styles.

The group visited the 1820s Pockerley Old Hall, the 1900s pit village, colliery, drift mine and town, the 1940s farm and Land Girls' cottage, and the 1950s town. They also discussed some of their favourite tv shows and movies that they had seen which rely on effective miseen-scene to reflect a particular period in time such as Bridgerton (1813), War Horse (1912), Dunkirk (1940) Elvis (1950s), Grease (1959), Dirty Dancing (1963) Bohemian Rhapsody (1970-80s) and Rocket Man (1950s-80s).

Students realised that mise-en-scene does not just apply to period pieces; they also considered the importance of sets, makeup, costume and props in all movie genres such as sci-fi or horror. This will help them in their current coursework unit.

Geography goes to Pondon

Vear 10 Geography students have enjoyed an action-packed educational trip to London to visit the Olympic Park and West End.

On day one, the group explored the city before heading to the Apollo Victoria Theatre for a spectacular performance of 'Wicked'. "I joined King James in 2012 during Year 9. By 15 years old, I knew I wanted to be an architect, and thanks to an inspiring period of work experience in Year 11 where I was able to work in the field of archaeology, I realised that my passion lay with architectural preservation and restoration projects. Moving into Sixth Form at King James was a natural progression for me, and I studied A' Level History, Art and Applied Science from 2015-17, before moving on to study a three-year Degree in Architecture at the University of Liverpool, which was a fantastic experience."



"During the summer of my undergraduate programme, between years 2 and 3, I spent six weeks in Shanghai

on an internship with The Anken Group. I organised this independently because I wanted to travel and gain experience with a company that focuses on renovation of buildings rather than replacement, which is completely in line with my own ethos. I learned so much about professional practice in China during this visit, but I also gained confidence in my own ability to adapt to any situation alone. It was an amazing experience and something I would recommend to anyone studying at university."

"When I graduated from university, I enjoyed a three-month long ERASMUS+ placement in Crete, working with the company, Peppas Nikolaos Architects. As part of this, I was able to contribute to the tourism industry through the renovation of historic Greek buildings, which allowed me to expand my knowledge further by studying different building techniques and materials. Again, this was a brilliant experience, and one which gave me a host of design ideas for future projects and helped to build my confidence and resilience; I even learned to speak a little Greek!"

"When I returned to the UK, I worked for four months with local company, DWJ Building and Groundworks in Crook so that I could see how construction works first hand. It was fascinating to be able to see how projects are realised from plan, and the importance of effective project management. Following this, I then spent nine months on placement with Crescent Architects, a small practice in North Yorkshire, where I was able to work on a number of independent projects. This was immediately followed by a seven-month placement with the DB3 Group in Aberystwith, Wales. This large, award-winning company is well known for projects in sport, leisure, retail and residential sectors throughout the UK and Internationally, so I was able to gain experience working on conservation designs with budgets from £5-15 million."

"Currently, I am living in Belfast and studying a two-year Master of Architecture at Queen's University of Belfast; I have already completed year one. I just love learning and developing my knowledge and skills wherever I can, so this was a natural next step for me. During the summer, I was given a bursary to attend the SPAB (Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings) Conference in Kent which was fantastic. It was great to be surrounded by like minded people with the same love for architectural conservation as me."

"In the future, I aspire to build a reputation as an architect for historic buildings and their renovation and preservation. I love travelling, so I would ideally like to be in the position where I could combine this with work. Australia has an array of fantastic Colonial architecture, constructed during the period of European settlement from 1788 to 1840, so I intend to plan a working visit to study it in person. I would also like to visit the New England areas of America. If I was to offer advice to others, it would be to embrace every opportunity that arises to gain experience in the field you hope to enter, and to learn as much as possible from industry professionals. Take control of your own future and never be afraid to seek your own internships, both in the UK and abroad; you will not regret it and will benefit immensely."

The fully certificated course, called Emergency First Aid in the Workplace, is approved by the FAA and delivered by Jonathan Page, our on-site First Aid Trainer Assessor. Sessions include a combination of classroom learning and hands-on treatment scenarios to give a broad overview of emergency first aid. Students learned CPR techniques, including how to do primary and secondary surveys and put patients into the recovery position, how to use an AED defibrillator and how to deal with seizures. They also practiced treatment of minor injuries such as cuts, bruises, scrapes and burns.

One student, who found themselves in a situation just one day after the course when a family member suffered a seizure said, "I am so glad I I signed up. Thanks to the course I knew what to do and was able to remain calm and use the recovery position until help arrived." At the request of participants we are now looking at delivering a more advanced course.
